Text: Looking Out, Looking In, 14th Edition, by Adler and Proctor. This text is required for this specific course.

Course Description: This course is designed for students to develop and/or enhance communication skills and to use those skills to interact effectively in family, social, and professional relationships. Relevant concepts include an introduction to communication theory, self-concept, perception, language, nonverbal communication, self-disclosure and conflict management.

Course Objectives and Competencies

The student should be able to:

- Distinguish the interpersonal communication context from other communication contexts.
- Understand self-concept and its relationship to interpersonal communication.
- Demonstrate an awareness of the effect of perception on interpersonal communication.
- Critically evaluate and apply appropriate emotional expression in interpersonal interactions.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of language on relationships.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of nonverbal communication on relationships.
- Demonstrate effective listening and response strategies.
- Recognize and describe appropriate strategies for self-disclosure.

- Analyze conflict situations and propose approaches for conflict management and resolution.
- Illustrate understanding of gender and cultural influences on interpersonal communication.
- Recognize concepts of relationship dynamics.
- Demonstrate understanding of the link between technology and interpersonal communication.

Topics to be Discussed

In an effort to suit the needs of the learner, topics will be taught through diverse methodologies. Some of these methods will include class discussion, lecture, group activity, demonstration and presentation. Any of them may be accompanied or enhanced by the use of technology. These topics include, but are not limited to:

- The Interpersonal Communication Process;
- Communication and Identity, including the Self;
- Perception;
- Emotions;
- Language;
- Nonverbal Communication;
- Listening;
- Relational Dynamics;
- Close Relationships;
- Communication Climates; and
- Interpersonal Conflicts.

Requirements and Guidelines/Points

I. Quizzes – 15% for each Quiz for a total of 60%

There will be four quizzes. These quizzes are designed to help you stay on task with the material in the course. If you pace yourself with the reading and content given by the instructor, you should be able to succeed on these quizzes! Unfortunately, there are <u>no</u> makeups for missed quizzes. Yet, if you miss a quiz for <u>any</u> reason, or choose not to take a specific quiz, then, instead of receiving a zero on the quiz that you have missed, you will have the opportunity to have the <u>next</u> quiz count for 30%, instead of 15%. If you miss the first quiz, then the grade on the second quiz will count for 30%, instead of 15%. If you take quizzes one, two and three, you will be allowed to double the third quiz and count the score from the third quiz for the fourth quiz. Please remember that you may only miss one quiz. If you miss more than one quiz, then you will receive a zero on the second quiz that you have missed. You will be informed of the specific chapters from the book that will be on each specific quiz. You are responsible for all of the information shown in DVD's and videotapes or disseminated on D2L and in handouts distributed in class. Please remember that your fellow classmates are not required to share emails or phone numbers with you. The instructor will not be responsible for providing you with information that you have missed <u>if</u> you are absent, unless there is a documented emergency, so it is imperative that you attend every class.

II. Tests -20% for the Final to be given in class

The test is comprehensive. Please keep in mind that there is no scheduled makeup for the test. If you are <u>not</u> present on the day that the test is administered, then you risk receiving a zero on the test. Please note that reviews will <u>only</u> be provided for the quizzes. You will not be given a review for the comprehensive exam.

You are not allowed to leave the classroom for any reason during a quiz or test. If you do so, you will not be allowed to continue taking the quiz or test and your grade will be assigned based on the work that you have completed on that quiz or test. All cell phones and all technical devices must be put out of sight during the

quizzes and test. You will not be allowed to answer a cell phone or listen to any music during class time. Also, you are discouraged from using a laptop during class time except for taking notes. **If** it is discovered that you are visiting other websites during class while using your laptop, you will be advised to not bring your laptop back to class for the remainder of the semester. Perusing other websites and doing other activities or assignments during class time is distracting to the instructor and to your fellow classmates.

III. Class Participation – 15% for attending and participating in activities in class

Class participation is required in this course. Aside from actively participating in class discussions, you will have the opportunity to participate in activities, which will cover specific concepts that are being taught in the class. You can earn up to one percentage point during each class for participation. The participation grade is based on your positive contribution to each class. Please attend each class so that you may learn from your instructor and peers. You are responsible for coming prepared to class since you may be asked to discuss information from chapters in the text with the rest of the class. You must participate to receive credit and you must be respectful of the instructor and your peers. Your participation must reflect your knowledge of the material. You need to stay current with the reading of the chapters in the text because, if you are not prepared, when asked to discuss a topic, then you risk receiving a zero for class participation for that day. Since this is a three weekend class that meets for three consecutive Saturdays and Sundays, you are only allowed to miss two hours and forty-five minutes without penalty. This absence can be used if you are ill or have a personal issue. If an attendance sheet is provided and if you do not sign it for any reason, you risk being counted as absent. If you are tardy to class, or must leave the class prior to the time that the class ends, please put the time that you have missed next to your name on the attendance sheet. Being tardy to class or leaving the class early can affect your participation points. Please remember to sign your name legibly on the attendance sheet. If it is not legible, you risk being counted as absent for the date that it is not legible on the attendance sheet. Please note that if the instructor determines that your presence is distracting or detracting in any way from the learning environment of your peers, or if you are disrespectful to your peers or the instructor, the instructor can lower your final grade, in this course, up to one whole letter grade. You may also be asked to leave the class if you are disruptive to the learning environment. Please do not pack up your items prior to the end of class, since this action can be disruptive to the other learners. There are no excused absences in this course. These contact hours and participation points start the **first** day of class, as listed in the class schedule.

IV. **Journal Assessment** – 5% You will be asked to read specific journal articles related to the subject matter of this course and then take a quiz to assess your knowledge of the material in the journal articles. Information regarding this assignment will be placed on D2L, but the assessment over the content in these journal articles will be given in class. There will be no make ups for this assignment that will assess your knowledge of the journal articles, but everyone will have the opportunity to earn <u>some</u> extra credit on the four quizzes given in class. The extra credit that will be on the quizzes will be worth considerably less credit than the quiz over the journal articles, so try not to miss the assessment over the journal articles. There are no make-ups for the extra credit that is given on the quizzes. If you do not take a specific quiz, you do not earn the extra credit that is on the quiz that you have missed. See extra credit which is V.

V. **Extra Credit** – You will have the opportunity to receive some extra credit in this class. The extra credit will be on the quizzes and calculated in each quiz grade. Please take notes in class and always take notes from any DVD's or other forms of social media that are viewed in class.

Finally, try to come to class with a positive attitude. Remember that the instructor <u>and</u> your classmates <u>want</u> you to succeed! Your participation grade will be based on your contribution as a listener and group member. Your peers and your instructor deserve your full attention as a listener throughout the course. Try to reflect this in your positive nonverbal and verbal communication.

Please do not talk while others are talking and kindly do not work on outside assignments during this class. Kindly do not carry on conversations with other students when another person is speaking in class. You need to direct your full attention to the concepts being discussed in this class. Because nonverbal communication is such an important component in the communication process, kindly remove your hat in class and sit in your chair with your feet planted on the floor and with your chair facing toward the speaker. Your body language can reflect your attentiveness in class.

INSTRUCTOR'S POSITION PAPER
