COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Examines the communication involved in interpersonal relationships occurring in family, social, and career situations. Relevant concepts include self-concept, perception, listening, nonverbal communication, and conflict.

- Illustrate understanding of gender and cultural influences on interpersonal communication.
- Recognize concepts of relationship dynamics.
- Demonstrate understanding of the link between technology and interpersonal communication.

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

Because communication skills are important to helping students achieve success in their careers and personal lives, I strive to teach my students to build relevant skills and see the personal value of the course material. At the core of my teaching is a philosophy that focuses on fostering deep learning of the course topics and building an inclusive classroom community. My teaching aligns strongly with the notion that the purpose of teaching is to make student learning possible. I endeavor to embody this philosophy by setting specific goals for student learning, engaging in a variety of teaching methods that are targeted to these goals, employing assessments that effectively measure student learning, and building an inclusive learning environment.

ASSIGNMENTS

IN-CLASS ASSIGNMENTS

During class, there will be several assignments that will be turned in for a grade. These assignments are typically handouts that coincide with certain lessons and will be completed in class either individually or with a group. Instructions for each assignment will be provided when they are assigned in class. Each assignment will be worth 20 points, and you must be present in class during the time it is assigned in order to be able to complete it.

END-OF-CLASS QUIZZES

At the end of each class session, there will be a short, 20 point quiz that covers key concepts covered in class that day. Question formats will vary. You are encouraged to take good notes during class and while completing the assigned readings, because you will be permitted to use these notes on your quiz. Use of the textbook during the quizzes will not be permitted. You must be in class at the time the quiz is assigned in order to take the quiz. If you leave class before the quiz has been taken, you have missed the quiz and will not be able to make it up.

INSIDE OUT ASSIGNMENT

During one class session, we will be watching the movie "Inside Out." You will be given a handout in class which you will use to write up a detailed analysis of some of the communication components of the movie. You will then type up your analysis and turn it in the following week. Additional details about this assignment will be given in class, and this assignment is worth 40 points.

ORDINARY DAYS ASSIGNMENT

On Friday, November 10, we will be attending the school's production of the musical, "Ordinary Days." You will be given an assignment to analyze the relationships in the play. Attending the play is free, but in order to get your free ticket, you must go to the Student Life Desk with your student ID sometime before the date of the play to pick up your voucher for a free ticket. This assignment will be completed in class after the play and is worth 40 points.

INCOMPETENT COMMUNICATOR PAPER

We will have one formal paper assignment in this class, the Incompetent Communicator paper. In this 4-5 page paper, you will be analyzing the communication of someone who you have found to be difficult to communicate with. This assignment will be due electronically by 11:59pm on the last day of the course. Detailed instructions for this assignment will be posted on the course Desire2Learn page. You can withdraw between the drop and withdrawal dates without affecting your grade point average. However, if you withdraw from a class you will be responsible for full payment and you will lose COF credits. ATTENDANCE POLICY

Class attendance is required in this class and is critical to your success in this course. Because we are a weekend three-week class, missing one class period is akin to missing several weeks of a full-semester class. Attendance will be taken each day. Attendance and participation for each class period are worth 20 points. Missing a class will result in a deduction of 20 points from your attendance and participation grade, as well as the loss of any points for in-class assignments and quizzes for that day. If you are late to class or if you leave early, you will forfeit a portion of your attendance points for the day depending

on how late you arrive or how early you leave. Additionally, if you arrive late or leave early you will forfeit the points for any assignments or quizzes that took place during the period you were absent.

In addition, the nature of this course relies on your contributions to in-class discussions and activities. You must actively participate in class in order to receive full participation points for the day. Your participation grade will be based on participation in class discussions/activities, classroom etiquette, and active engagement in learning. Note that participation also includes coming prepared with any worksheets/activities that I ask you to prepare.

Excused absences: Excused absences are assessed at instructor discretion and will be granted only in extreme circumstances. These absences are excused only with written documentation provided in a timely manner. In order to get an absence excused, you must show me the <u>original</u> copy of your documentation so that I can note it in my attendance records. I cannot accept photocopies of your documentation. If you are unsure as to whether an absence counts as excused, please come talk to me about it. I cannot excuse your absence if I am not made aware of the reason for it. If you are absent (excused or unexcused) please contact one of your classmates to find out what you missed in class.

If you come in after attendance has been taken or miss the sign-in sheet for any reason, it is your responsibility to let me know by the end of class that you were present. Failure to sign the attendance roster will result in you being counted as absent.

DEADLINES AND PENALTIES

The very nature of this course demands that we stick to a firm schedule. Therefore, late assignments will not be accepted. The majority of assignments will be completed in class, and you must be present when they are assigned in order to receive credit for them. Readings and assignments must be completed on the day they are assigned on the course schedule. Be sure to read the book and take notes while reading; lectures are intended to *complement* (not duplicate) that information, so completing readings before class is very important.

Deadlines are posted in your course schedule. For reading assignments, you should come to class having read the chapters for the concepts we are covering that day. The Incompetent Communicator Paper is due at

There will be a 5 point deduction from your participation grade if your cell phone rings during class. Using an electronic device in class for anything other than taking notes or participating in a class activity will result in a 5 point deduction from your participation grade.

Email Policy: Emails to the entire class will always be sent through Desire2Learn. It is your responsibility to check your D2L email regularly throughout the week. Failure to regularly check email may result in missed information, assignments, and points.

Contacting Me: Email is the best way to reach me (D2L is preferred). I will usually return your message within 48 hours of the sent time listed on the message, but weekends and holidays may be longer. You should also check your email often to check for announcements; emails to the class will always be sent via D2L. If you have a question concerning an assignment, please contact me by email at least 48 hours prior to the date that assignment is due.

Grades: Grades and attendance will be posted in the D2L grade book throughout the term. All assignments will be returned in a timely manner, and I will keep the class updated on my timeline for returning each assignment. I strive to give quality feedback on each assignment, so it is important for you to read the feedback carefully before discussing your grades with me. Also, check your grades on D2L each week and inform me of any errors or questions.
