Attendance and Participation:

Regular attendance is expected for class. You will not be able to be successful in this class if you miss one of our six meetings. If you do I encourage you to drop and retake the course. Students who miss more than 4 hours of class will have their grade lowered by one letter grade. If a whole weekend is missed the student will be asked to drop or withdraw from the course or receive a failing grade. Students who encounter a personal emergency while enrolled in the course should speak to their respective instructor(s) immediately. If class is cancelled due to snow or instructor absence you will be informed through D2L of what changes there will be to make up for the lost session.

Participation points will be given at the end of the semester based on the student's active engagement in the lecture, class activities, etc. Asking questions, providing insights, and showing attentive listening will be factored into your final participation grade (100 pts).

The class will be graded on a total point basis. You can keep track of your current grade by dividing your current points by the total points possible at that time in the semester. I will regularly update D2L with scores you have received on assignments throughout the semester. If you complete an extra-credit assignment, those points will be added to your current points but will NOT change to total possible.

D2L:

Expect to use D2L consistently throughout the course. You will find class announcements, uploaded resources such as PowerPoints, handouts and assignments, tests, online discussions and drop boxes on here. **All papers will be turned in through D2L ONLY!** All tests will be given on D2L. This means that you can use your textbook and notes while taking these. There will only be one test in this course at the end of the semester. The final will have multiple-choice questions. If you are having ANY problems getting onto D2L or navigating the site, you can email ehelpdesk@rrcc.edu or seek help in the library or computer labs. You will also find your critical thinking question prompts in D2L.

Online Discussions:

You will have two online discussions due for this course. You can find the designated prompts in D2L under the "Discussion" section. Please respond to the designated prompt with a minimum of two (thoughtful!) paragraphs. You will also need to respond to two of your classmates' posts. Be respectful of their thoughts while asking further questions of them, adding new insights, talking about why you do or don't agree, etc. Please be sure to spell and grammar check your work before posting for everyone to read.

Article Review Paper:

The purpose of the article review paper is to integrate the information found in your textbook and discussed in class with current information found in a newspaper, scholarly journal, or other reputable source. Papers will be typed 1-2 **FULL** pages reviewing any article you find interesting that relates to what we are discussing in class. Questions addressed in your article review must include the following:

- 1. How does the article relate to what we are discussing in lecture?
- 2. Why is this information important?
- 3. What might be some problems or limitations with the information?

You will also want to consider your personal opinion of the article, its author, and the main message. You may reference your textbook, class notes, or any other resource you find useful. If you have plagiarized any material in your article review paper, you will get a zero on the assignment. There is a grading rubric on D2L for you to follow when writing your papers as well.

ALL papers MUST be double spaced and written in 12 point Times New Roman font, as specified by the APA. You must turn papers in D2L in the specific drop box provided. Please save your document using your first and last name, in addition to the title of the paper, as a word document before uploading.

Top 5:

The Top 5 assignments will be done online through D2L. Each of them will have a corresponding dropbox in which you can submit your word document. The lists require you to identify five key concepts/ideas that you learned from the reading. You should indicate <u>what</u> you learned and <u>why</u> it is important to you. (two sentence minimum for each item).

New Experience Activity

For this assignment you will be asked to participate in a new experience that explores sexuality. The goal of this assignment is for you to reflect on your experience and show a deeper understanding or insight into the topic of sexuality and how it relates to your own experience. The activities you can choose from are watching pornography, going to a gay bar, attending an LGBTQ+ event, reading a porn magazine, reading a romance novel, attending a class/meeting about sexuality (AIDS awareness, SAA Meeting, etc.) or going to an adult store. You can present another option requiring instructor approval. For your reflection, topics I want you to cover are:

- 4. Describe your experience.
 - a. Who did you go with, when was it, other logistics, etc.
- 5. How did you decide on this activity?

- 6. What is something new you learned from this experience?
- 7. How did this change your beliefs/understanding about sexuality?
- 8. How does your experience connect to a topic we covered or will cover in class?

The reflection needs to be **3-4 Full Pages** but does not need to be written in APA format.

Final Exam:

Your final exam will be 75 multiple choice questions for 2pts each. It will cover every chapter of the textbook and will NOT include questions on additional discussions, readings, etc. You will be given one week to complete the final exam and it will become available on the final day of class immediately after class ends. The test will be taken online through D2L and you will have only one attempt. You will not be allowed to save your progress but CAN use your textbook and notes. However, taking the test with other students or using others as a resource is not allowed.
