Plate Tectonics GEY 125

Course Description: Presents the theory of plate tectonics and its relationship to continental movement, oceans, mountain building, earthquakes, and volcanoes.

Course Objectives: Upon completion of GEY 125, students will be able to:

* Describe the internal structure of the earth

* Define and discuss the theory of plate tectonics and its development

* Describe the process of continental breakup and re-joining

* Relate plate tectonics to the origin of oceans, mountains, volcanoes, and earthquakes.

Evaluation:

Latecomers will lose their attendance points (up to 10 points per day of class).

- Participation credit will be awarded at 5 points per day for being attentive, participating in discussions, and responding to instructor prompts. Points may be deducted for napping in class or otherwise 'checking out.'
- In-class worksheets will be submitted to the instructor for grading. Points may be reduced for an individual if it becomes apparent that the individual is not contributing to the group.
- Understanding of the subject matter will be periodically evaluated with short, 1-2 question quizzes worth a small number of points, totaling 10 throughout the class.
- A short, 2-4 page paper on a tectonics-related topic of the student's choice (subject to instructor approval) will take the place of a final examination, and will be due approximately one and one-half weeks after the end of class. Further instructions, a grading rubric, and a sample paper will be provided during class.

General Policies

- Attendance: Because of the short-term nature of GEY 125, attendance is absolutely required for the totality of both class days, and any missed quizzes or assignments may not be made up. Please note that 60% of your grade is based on in-class work and attendance, making it impossible to pass without attending. Latecomers will have their attendance/ participation grade reduced by up to the maximum for the day. Students are responsible for ensuring that they do not have previous commitments on class days. Incompletes will not be given; students who find themselves unable to attend class for emergency reasons will be responsible for initiating the drop or withdrawal process to prevent a grade of "F" being recorded for the class.
- Assignments Policy: Due to <u>very tight</u> grade submission deadlines for weekend classes, all assignments must be submitted by their stated deadlines, and **NO credit, either full or partial, will be awarded for late assignments**. Students with deadline accommodations requested by the Office of Disability Services may have a separate agreed-upon deadline, but will not receive any credit for assignments submitted after that deadline.
