This course covers the history of the growth and development of Colorado with primary emphasis on the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. It treats Native American and Hispanic influence; exploration and mining and trapping; early settlements, pioneer life, labor, and aspects of the state's political history.

### Field Work Write Ups (300 points)

You will produce a paper for each of the field trips we will take during this course. One on Dinosaur Ridge, one on Denver, and one on the Belmar building museum. Each paper will be three to four pages of text, double spaced, Times New Roman Font. Each paper will detail the significance of the site as a historical or geographical point of interest in Colorado, you will also detail how each site was preserved and maintained into the current period. Each paper is worth 100 points.

### Book Review and Presentation (100 points)

During the course of the semester you will be required to submit one book reviews worth 75 points, you will then present it before the class for 25 points. This should be a four to five page double spaced review of a historic work. Your paper should be in 12point New Times Roman font. Only the actual text of the paper will count towards your length requirements. Be sure to include the author's/authors' full names, the full title, place of publication in the heading. In the review you should summarize the book you have read. This should be about 2/3 of your paper. Then you should analyze the book's historical relevance, its strengths and weaknesses, be sure to also pay attention to the types of sources (primary and secondary) and citations used by the author, as well as any biases the author might display in their work. Books should be 200 pages or more, nonfiction, and should focus on any aspect of Colorado History. I recommend using the library as the price is right. Plagiarism will not be tolerated and you receive a zero on the assignment. I do NOT accept late work. You must submit original work for both of these you may not recycle papers from other classes. Below is your rubric for your written paper.
