COURSE REQUIREMENTS / EXPECTATIONS

It is necessary to attend class to hear lectures, participate in discussions and take advantage of the art projects. After 3 absences, the instructor may drop the final letter grade by one. Students are expected to

complete all quizzes, written assignments, and be present in class for the art projects, and, if applicable, post and comment on discussions, links, or videos.

All written assignments will be turned into D2L. All quizzes will be conducted on D2L. All written assignments will be processed through *turnitin* which will assess originality percentages. Plagiarism of content will result in an "F" for the assignment and possibly an "F" for the course.

Grading policy

The majority of the graded work for this course will be conducted online, that being said, discussions, presentations and art projects will happen during class time, a student should be able to work around any time issues that come up due to auto trouble, family issues, etc... since all due dates for assignments are posted online. Quizzes, discussions and turning in of written assignments will all be conducted online and will have a window of time in which to complete them, allowing the student flexibility in terms of arranging schedules. For this reason, missed tests or assignments will be given a zero.

There will be two written assignments, each worth 25 points each. (50 points) One written assignment will be based on a trip to the Denver Art Museum. The second written assignment will be based on a First Friday Gallery walk. Both written assignments will have online options for completion.

Three online discussions, each worth 20 points. (60 points) These discussions will be connected to chapters not covered during face to face class time.
