## METHODS OF EVALUATION / GRADING / ASSESSMENT

GRADES IN THE COURSE WILL BE DETERMINED AS FOLLOWS:

**Tests:** There will be 3 tests across the duration of the course (one each weekend), consisting of 25 multiple choice questions, each covering six chapters, to be taken via D2L. The last 2 hours of each Saturday will be dedicated to test taking. You have the option of taking it in the classroom on your own device, on campus in the library or student center, or on your own by each Sunday night at midnight.

**In Class Exercises/Discussions:** There will be approximately 10-12 exercises and discussions in class comprising 40 points which require your attendance and participation for credit.

**Assignments:** There will be 2 assignments worth 40 points each, due weekend 2 and 3. Detailed instructions will be provided on the first day of class, or can be found in the D2L 'content' tab, as well as the dropbox folders
