BUS 1015	Introduction to Business Focuses on the operation of the American business system. Covers fundamentals of the economy, careers and opportunities, marketing, management, production, governmental regulations, tools of business and social responsibilities.	3

Course	Description	Credits
CRJ 1010	Intro to Criminal Justice Introduces students to the basic components of the criminal justice system in the United States. Concepts of crime, crime data, victimization, perspectives and views of crime, theory, and law are discussed. Particular attention to the criminal justice process, interaction and conflict between criminal justice agencies, and current criminal justice issues are examined. This is a statewide Guaranteed Transfer course in the GT-SS3 category.	3
CRJ 1025	Policing Systems Examines policing in the United States, including historical foundations, emerging issues, and the relationship between law enforcement and the community. The various types of law enforcement agencies, their administrative practices, and the behavior of those involved in the delivery of police services are examined from the perspective of democratic values, racial and ethnic diversity, and societal perceptions of police effectiveness. Career requirements, including current and future trends, are also presented.	3
CRJ 1035	Judicial Functions Provides an overview of the structure and function of the dual American judicial system and the behavior of actors (judges/justices, lawyers, law clerks, interest groups, etc.) within the system. Emphasis is placed on the organization and administration of state and federal courts, criminal court procedures, juries, selection of judges, decision-making behavior of juries, judges and justices, and the implementation and impact of judicial policies	3
CRJ 1045	Correctional Process Examines the history and total correctional process from law enforcement through the administration of justice, probation, prisons, correctional institutions, and parole. Also examines the principles, theories, phenomena	3

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	and problems of the crime, society, and the criminal justice system from the perspective of criminology and the criminal justice system in general. Emphasizes the role of sociology and other interdisciplinary approaches to the field of corrections and society's response.	
SOC 1001	<p>Intro to Sociology I</p> <p>This course examines the basic concepts, theories, and principles of sociology, including topics of culture, race, class, gender, sexuality, social groups, and deviance through a local and global lens. Analyzes and interprets socio-historic as well as contemporary issues by using critical thinking skills and linking individual experiences to social structures. This course includes current issues of education reform, technology as it relates to education, and considerations related to becoming a teacher in the state of Colorado. <p>EDU 2088</p>	<p>Practicum II</p> <p>Provides students with the opportunity to supplement coursework with practical work experience related to their educational program. Students work under the immediate supervision of experienced personnel at the education facility and with the direct guidance of the instructor.</p>	<p>1</p>

<p>BIO 1004</p>	<p>Biology: A Human Approach</p>	<p>4</p>

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	Develops a basic knowledge of the structure and function of the human body by studying the body's structure as a series of interrelated systems. Includes cardiovascular, respiratory, digestive, lymphatic, musculoskeletal, nervous, endocrine, reproductive and urinary systems, and genetics. Emphasizes disease prevention and wellness. This course includes laboratory experience. This is a statewide Guaranteed Transfer course in the GT-SC1 category	
BIO 1005	Science of Biology w/Lab Examines the basics of biology in the modern world and surveys the current knowledge and conceptual framework of the discipline. BIO 105 explores biology as a science- a process of gaining new knowledge- and the impact of biological science on society. This course includes laboratory experiences and is designed for non-science majors.	4

HPR 1040	Comprehensive Medical Terminology Provides an in-depth study of the structure of medical terms with emphasis on using and combining common prefixes, roots and suffixes.	3

MOT 1036	<p>Intro to Clinical Skills</p> <p>Provides hands on experience with the basic clinical skills required for assisting with patient care in an ambulatory setting.</p>	3

Basic nursing skills, communication skills, restorative services, personal care skills, safety and emergency care issues are covered. Includes knowledge and/or principles of asepsis, OSHA and HIPPA regulations. Ethical behaviors, cultural sensitivity and principles of mental health will be addressed, as well as patient/resident rights.</p>	4

HWE 1061	<p>Fitness and Wellness</p> <p>Provides information on fitness and wellness and to serve as a guide to design, implement, and evaluate a complete personal fitness and wellness program. The course integrates the basic components of fitness and wellness in understanding human health in order to achieve well-being. This course offers current information in the health field and provides self-assessments for health risk and well ness behaviors. This includes lifestyle modification, nutrition, weight management, stress management, cardiovascular and cancer risk reduction, exercise and aging, exercise related injury exercise and the environment, prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, substance abuse (including tobacco, alcohol and other psychoactive drugs), and analysis and interpretation of research publications and websites in health and wellness.</p> <p>No prerequisite for this course.</p>	2

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HWE 1065	<p>Intro to Exercise Health Science</p> <p>Introduces the discipline of kinesiology, including the effects of physical activity and exercise on the human physiology and human experience. The course also explores career options including expectations of professionals in the field.</p>	3
HWE 1068	<p>Certified Personal Trainer Prep Course</p> <p>Provide the student with theoretical knowledge and practical skills in preparation for a nationally recognized personal training certification approved by the Colorado Community College System. These Certifications are limited to the following: ACSM, ACE, NSCA, NCSF, AFAA, and AEA. Upon certification, the student will have the ability to develop and implement exercise programs for healthy populations and/or those individuals with medical clearance to exercise.</p>	3

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
